

The four Ideal 18 sailboats are for the use of our members. They can be used for racing, or just a day sail. They can fit up to four people. The skipper must be "qualified" to take a boat out. Qualification involves proving to the fleet captain or his representative that you know how to handle the boat and understand the rules of usage. Once you are qualified you can take a boat out whenever you want during the summer season. If/when you think you are qualified, contact fleet captain Joe Pelletier. If your goal is to become qualified, take our sailing lessons. If you want to race the boats either as skipper or crew (crew does not have to be qualified, just enthusiastic and in reasonable physical condition), contact Tom Atkinson (commodore23@essexcorinthian.org) to be added to the Ideal 18 racing group e-mail address. This group e-mail address is used to communicate with each other about upcoming sailing events, skippers seeking crew, and organizing boat maintenance work parties. Racing opportunities are:

Spring frostbiting every Sunday in March & April
Summer Tuesday Night Racing
Summer Thursday Night Racing with spinnakers
EYC Rum Challenge Regatta for Ideal 18s in mid July
Fall frostbiting every Sunday in October & November

Eleven ECYC members travelled to Newport, Rhode Island on Father's Day and sailed the 1958 America's Cup winner Columbia. It was a cool, fall like day, and the winds were a solid 15 knots from the north. The boat was in beautiful shape, and the ride was powerful and smooth. Speed was 8-9 knots on all points of sail. The boat came with a three man crew, but they graciously(?) allowed us to grind the two man stand up winches when tacking (thank you Dan and Jim). They allowed us to steer only off the wind because the boat had running backstays which, if the windward stay is not kept tight, could allow the mast to break - they didn't want any accidental tacks. Participants were Dan Rennie and his father Gregg, Jim & Debbie Hammel and their two college age kids, Jim Coan and his stepson, Gillian Nixon, and Pat & Tom Atkinson. Incidentally, Columbia's skipper was Briggs Cunningham, whose eponymous invention replaced the downhaul and is well known by Ideal 18 crew.



All four club boats participated in the **Ideal 18 Rum Challenge Regatta July 16th**.

Winds were a shifty 6-8 knots from the south/southeast with an incoming current. The course was near the north end of Nott Island. The debate before the first race was - do you go left on the beat to get out of the current, but risk entering the wind shadow of Nott Island? Or do you go right to keep your air clear but sail against the current? It turned out that playing the middle combined with tacking on favorable wind shifts worked best.

Judy Saunders won the day with two firsts, two seconds, and a third (six races total, one throw out). Pat Connelly with crew Chuck Grusse finished third, also winning two races. Dan Rennie with crew Jane Reilly finished fourth, and Jim and Debbie Hammel fifth.

Getting to Know: Fleet Chaplain Dan Taylor-Stypa

Greetings all! I have been asked by Commodore Atkinson to describe for you the role of a "Fleet Chaplain". I have had the honor to be the ECYC Fleet Chaplain since the early 90's. It has been my privilege to provide invocations and benedictions for many Commissionings and DeCommissionings through the years.

Recently I completed my GIP (General in Patient) hospice chaplain with Hartford Health Care @ Home, serving patients and their families at Hartford Hospital, The Hospital of Central Connecticut, St. Vincent's Medical Center and Charlotte Hungerford Hospital. The term "capellano" is very familiar to me in my providing care to many Latino / Hispanic patients, this is the title with which I was referred to. It hit home as I share the historical origins of "Chaplain" with you later in this article.



Specifically, a Fleet Chaplain is a vital member of any naval or commando unit, with a unique congregation (Yacht Club). The team of men and women who make up the Naval Service come from all walks of life. They do extraordinary jobs in extraordinary circumstances, all over the world, 365 days a year. It means they need a unique type of support. Fleet Chaplains are people who are of and practice all faith traditions. Aside from providing invocations and benedictions for the official opening (Commissioning) and closing (De-Commissioning) of the yacht club, some of the other means of presence and support I provide to club members are; I have accompanied members in need of emergent care to Medical Centers, when informed of a club member being hospitalize or recuperating a phone call is made to offer support on behalf of the ECYC and a get well missive is mailed. When informed of a member's (or family member) passing a bereavement call is made and a sympathy note is sent on behalf of the ECYC membership. I have also provided for graveside services when able. I have had the many joyous occasions of Blessing of the Fleet, christening club members new boats, and providing the traditional service for the changing of a boat's name. Being a licensed Justice of the Peace for the town of Essex, I have had the wonderful opportunity of performing marriage ceremonies for club members and their families/friends. With the ECYC having a fabulous galley this makes for a "one stop" wedding venue, with catering from our galley, best view on the river, a spectacular location and an in-house Fleet Chaplain. For a more historical Christian perspective I am happy to share with you the story/legend of the origins of a chaplain's role. Wednesday the 11th of November is the feast of St Martin de Tours, the first chaplain! "The story of chaplaincy begins at the gate to the city of Amiens in 337 CE. Martin, a young soldier in the Roman army, was walking into the city during a bitterly cold winter. The crowds were hurrying past a half-naked beggar who was close to death. Martin, unpaid and having only his military uniform, stopped and looked at the man who gazed back at him expectantly, with hand outstretched. After a slight hesitation, Martin took out his sword and then removed his cloak and sliced it through the middle giving one half to the man and using the other half to cover himself again.

Some bystanders laughed at him and the ridiculous way he looked, wearing only half a cloak. But other bystanders felt ashamed that this poor soldier, from his poverty, had helped the beggar and made a difference, while they with money in their pockets, had ignored the beggar completely, walking away when challenged by Martin's actions.

Tradition has it that later that night Martin had a dream, he saw a vision of Christ himself wearing the half a cloak and saying to others "look at the cloak that Martin gave me today, he is only a poor soldier and a lay person". The dream so affected Martin that he tried to leave the army and in 339 CE he was released into civilian life. From there he went on to work for the poor and increase awareness of the presence of God in ordinary people. He created a number of communities and became a church leader. He died at Tours in 397 CE.

His cloak, or half a cloak, became a precious object in military and royal circles. It became a spiritual symbol for the whole community. The cloak was used in the taking of oaths and was carried into battle, it came to symbolize all that was best in humanity, a symbol of the spiritual dignity of each person and a powerful reminder of the need to seek God in ordinary things. The cloak was called a "cappella" – a cape. It was kept in a tent or in a building that came to be called a cappella, or chapel. The person assigned to look after this sacred relic was called the "capellano" or chaplain. The chaplain would provide access to the sacred symbol and organize prayers and ceremonies for the community to celebrate the spirituality it signified. These were the first people to be called chaplains. They began firstly in the military, then in royal courts, later in hospitals, educational institutions and yacht clubs.

The story highlights some key features of chaplaincy:

- ·It was inspired by a lay person's act of listening and serving the needy.
- ·It is based around the God-given dignity of each person in the community.
- ·It is a form of service that challenges others to think about their own lives.
- It involved safeguarding and celebrating the spiritual treasures of a community.
- St Martin of Tours' symbolic act casts a long shadow across world history. It touches all forms of chaplaincy in health, military and educational settings and points to the unique combination of religion, reflection and service all focused on a specific group's needs at a particular time and place."

I am grateful for this opportunity to describe more completely what a Fleet Chaplain's role is. Know I am here, when and if needed. For my being able to better provide support, please inform our Club Manager; Jean Little of any of your needs.
